SUBJECT: SB 420 (BECKER): ELECTRICAL TRANSMISSION FACILITY PROJECTS

> **SUPPORT - AS AMENDED JUNE 20, 2023 SCHEDULED FOR HEARING - JUNE 28, 2023**

The California Chamber of Commerce and the organizations listed strongly SUPPORT SB 420 (Becker). which builds upon the state's permit streamlining efforts for electrical transmission facility projects delivering clean energy to ensure we are better equipped to meet future energy demand.

The California Air Resources Board projects that meeting the state's clean energy targets will require electricity generation capacity four times larger than today's capacity. For example, five gigawatts of utilityscale solar generation must be built every year for the next 20 years to meet these targets - a rate approximately five times faster than today's trajectory. Increased demand for clean electricity must be met with a rapid and responsible expansion and upgrade of distribution lines, substations and other energy infrastructure. An analysis from the Lawrence Berkeley National Lab found that the interconnection process can take up to 3 years, noting that excessive environmental review and frivolous legal challenges are a significant contributor to the delay.

SB 420 Builds on the Direction Provided by SB 529 (Hertzberg)

SB 529 provided clear direction to the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) to update their existing general order to authorize electrical corporations to use a more streamlined process for an expansion, extension, or upgrade of an existing transmission facility. **SB 420** builds on the clear intent provided by SB 529 and expands the streamlined process to projects below 138 kilovolts. This language ensures that load serving entities have the appropriate tools in place to meet our future energy needs. Moreover, it will foster economic growth, create job opportunities, and position California as a leader in clean energy innovation.

SB 420 Appropriately Balances Environmental Protections with Future Energy Demand

SB 420 aligns with state and federal protections to streamline the regulatory approval process while protecting the public, environment, and wildlife. Specifically, **SB 420** prohibits a streamlined permitting process for any project that is located in a wetland, unpremeditated sites, or within a critical habitat as defined in State and Federal law. California must increase the state's capacity for renewable energy generation to better meet anticipated demand. **SB 420** will ensure a reliable supply of electricity for a growing economy and our residents and businesses by striking the appropriate balance between environmental protection and allowing load serving entities to save on project costs and delays which ultimately benefits ratepayers. **SB 420** offers a clear-eyed response to the state's clean energy goals so that California is best equipped to meet the ever-growing demand for clean energy in California.

For these reasons, we strongly support SB 420 and respectfully ask for your "AYE" vote.
